Wheelchairs For Kids Australia has shipped a 40-ft container with 350 wheelchairs to Jordan. With support from the Jordan Hashemite Charity Organisation, it will clear Aqaba and continue by convoy to the Rafah crossing and into Gaza, where the wheelchairs will be delivered to children injured in the ongoing conflict.

This special shipment was made possible by the Palestinian Australian & New Zealand Medical Association (PANZMA), a non-profit organisation that addresses health and humanitarian challenges by bringing together volunteer medical professionals to support communities affected by conflict, displacement and hardship.

Each wheelchair is purpose built to suit the challenging environments these children face. To ensure safe and proper fitting, WFKA translated the instruction manuals into Arabic so doctors and occupational therapists can confidently assemble them to suit each child's individual needs.

The war in Gaza has had devastating consequences on families and communities. Many children have suffered life-changing injuries and lost access to essential medical care. WFKA is proud to provide practical help that restores hope and mobility to those who need it most.

This container is part of our ongoing commitment to supporting vulnerable children worldwide.





Collaboration in Kenya – Mama Respond



Mama Respond is built on a simple belief: Every mother and child with special needs deserves access to care, education and support to live with dignity and independence.

This belief was at the core of a recent collaboration between Wheelchairs For Kids Australia and Mama Respond. A five day wheelchair training program was held in Kitengela, Kenya, an unforgettable week of training, teamwork and transformation.

Led by WFKA Occupational Therapists Linda McAllister and Kevin Baptist, together with Simon Mutugi and local occupational therapists, the training covered wheelchair assembly and adjustments from basic fittings to complex cases, giving everyone valuable hands-on experience.

Participants travelled from across Kenya and are now better equipped to assess each child's individual needs and advocate for families facing mobility challenges in their communities.

A highlight of the program was seeing nine children receive their wheelchairs, for many, it was their first time experiencing true mobility and independence.

Br. George Massay's Heartwarming Encounter

While visiting family in Tanzania's Manyara Region, Br George Massay CFC, from the Christian Brothers in Nairobi had a lovely surprise during a visit to Haydom Hospital. He came across children happily zooming around in wheelchairs made by Wheelchairs For Kids Australia, and it absolutely made his day.

Br George watched the kids move freely, clearly proud of their newfound mobility. When he introduced himself and shared photos of Br Olly Pickett and the WFKA volunteers, he was warmly welcomed with parents and children expressing heartfelt thanks for their wheelchairs.



Haydom Hospital, founded by Norwegian Lutheran missionaries, provides vital services to remote and low-income communities. Twice a year, it runs special programs for children with conditions like spina bifida and hydrocephalus offering care, therapy and life changing mobility equipment.

Br. George visited the WFKA factory back in 2024, so seeing the wheelchairs in action was a full-circle moment.

New Hope for Jahid

Young Jahid's smile said it all. After years of lying on the floor, he finally has a wheelchair of his own, thanks to WFKA and Global Village Foundation in Bali.

Abandoned as a baby, Jahid has been lovingly raised by his grandmother despite her own hardships. They live simply and until recently, he had never had access to a wheelchair. A donated adult wheelchair was their first, but it was far from ideal, offering little support or comfort for his small,

Years of immobility had left Jahid with scoliosis and joint stiffness. Though non-verbal, he understands everything





around him. The difference a proper wheelchair made was instant, he sat upright beaming with joy.

His grandmother holding back tears, thanked everyone from her heart. For the first time, they can leave the house with ease, giving them both a little more freedom, dignity and connection to the outside world.

Sewing Spirit

If you've wandered past the sewing corner at the Wheelchairs For Kids Australia factory lately, you've probably noticed a buzz of activity, sewing machines humming, fabric being cut and plenty of friendly chatter. That's thanks to the drive and heart of volunteer Rita Macintyre.

Since stepping up to coordinate the sewing team, Rita has helped transform the way it works. For many years, most of the sewing from seat covers to tool bags was done off-site by individuals and groups. While this worked well for a long time, it became harder to maintain consistent sizes and standards, especially with increasing demand.

By bringing more of the sewing process into the factory, control and accuracy have improved. Fabric is now pre-cut using clear templates, ensuring covers and bags consistently fit our wheelchairs perfectly. This also eases the strain on home sewers who may not have the space or tools to cut fabric safely or accurately.

The sewing space is now fully equipped with four sewing machines and a custom built cutting table.

Rita has stitched together a sewing community with purpose.

Barbara's Teddy Magic

Barbara Kenny is one of our kindhearted regulars at Wheelchairs For Kids Australia and her talent with knitting needles is making a difference.

Over the years, Barbara has lovingly created and donated hand-knitted teddies, each one unique, colourful and made with love, with her latest batch of 80 teddies sure to bring joy to the children receiving our wheelchairs.

Hope delivered by Global Village Foundation

On 1st July, the Global Village
Foundation Bali Wheelchair
Team began their second major
wheelchair distribution in
Lampung Province, Sumatra. This
event follows an October 2024
distribution, that also supported
170 children. The overwhelming
demand that followed prompted
GVF to return.

Over nine days, the team delivered and fitted 170 Wheelchairs For Kids Australia wheelchairs to disadvantaged children.

Departing Bali, the team flew to Bandar Lampung, where families



from remote regions travelled, some overnight to access the support. Lampung covers 36,000 square km and has a population of 9.5 million. Around 2.3 million are children, with an estimated 76,000 living with

disabilities. For many, obtaining a fitted wheelchair is impossible due to cost and access.

Each wheelchair is individually fitted by the GVF team, fittings can take up to three hours. On average, the team fits around 25 wheelchairs per day.

Global Village Foundation is the only NGO in Indonesia distributing WFKA wheelchairs nationwide. With support from government partners, sponsors and the GVF Kafe in Lovina Beach, this project brings mobility and new possibilities to children living with disabilities.

Rolling into Moroccan Hearts

In July 2025, Aussie volunteers Clara Reiger an Occupational Therapist, Sarah Lee and Bev Eldridge both Physiotherapists, headed to Morocco to work with Red Goes Faster. Travelling from Marrakech to the Zagora and Ouarzazate regions, they teamed up with local volunteers to fit and adjust wheelchairs for 20 children.

Each child is unique, so every wheelchair is carefully adjusted to suit their needs. Some children were able to get around on their own, even over rocky roads, while others needed full support.



The wheelchairs made their way home in all sorts of inventive ways, tied to bicycles, balanced on motorbikes and squeezed into the tiniest cars. The real magic came from the smiles on the children faces during their first ride, and the warmth of sharing cous cous Fridays and sweet tea with the lovely village families.

It was a heartwarming mix of mobility, connection an unforgettable glimpse into Moroccan culture and kindness.

Wheelchair Distribution Day in South Cotabato, Philippines

Our distribution partners, the Rotary Club of Metro Koronadal in South Cotabato, Philippines, held a Wheelchair Distribution Day on 10 May in partnership with the Rotary Club of Mt Apo. Ten children with cerebral palsy received wheelchairs.

Since November 2024, the Rotary Club of Metro Koronadal has distributed over 40 wheelchairs to children in need.
