Online Training Brings Hope to Nepal Children

Wheelchairs For Kids Australia Board Member and long-time occupational therapist Lois Moir had been planning a training trip to Nepal in November, but due to travel warnings, the visit had to be cancelled. Determined not to let the local therapists miss out, Lois arranged online training sessions with the Karuna Foundation so the program could continue.

Through these sessions, local physiotherapists were able to gain further skills in assessing, measuring and fitting wheelchairs for each child's unique needs.

Two young girls with cerebral palsy were fitted with their new wheelchairs during the sessions. An 8 year old from Dharan and a 9 year old from Itahari, both received individually fitted wheelchairs that have already made a real difference, improving their posture, mobility and comfort, easing the daily challenges faced by their families.

Thanks to Lois and the dedicated team in Nepal, children who once relied completely on others now have greater freedom to take part in everyday life.

From One Mother to Another - The Moment That Started No Ordinary Journey Foundation

Wheelchairs For Kids Australia has proudly partnered with the No Ordinary Journey Foundation (NOJF) since 2019. Founded by Canadian Laverne Bissky, NOJF is dedicated to providing mobility, training and support across Southeast Asia, enabling children with quality, properly fitted wheelchairs that give them lasting comfort and independence.

Laverne's inspiration came from a deeply personal moment. During their first wheelchair fitting in Battambang, Cambodia, a young boy's joy at moving independently touched everyone. Through a translator, they asked his mother how she felt, she burst into tears and so did Laverne. Standing outside the rehabilitation centre, the two mothers shared a profound moment of understanding. Laverne, whose own child has Cerebral Palsy, knew exactly what she was feeling. That encounter sparked the beginning of NOJF, supported by her husband and children.

While travelling through Southeast Asia, Laverne often saw children confined to beds or carried everywhere simply because they had no wheelchair. She knew firsthand how a wheelchair enabled her own family to travel and move freely and she wanted to bring that freedom to others.

From the start, sustainability was a priority. Laverne's goal was not only to provide wheelchairs but also to train local professionals in fitting, adjusting and maintaining them, while also helping agencies access the right equipment.

After seeing WFKA

reached out to Wheelchairs For
Kids Australia, sparking a lasting
partnership.

The first training sessions were held in Vietnam, where physiotherapists from centres nationwide learnt how to correctly fit and adjust the wheelchairs. Local charities assisted with importing, storing and delivering wheelchairs, even to remote locations. The next significant project took place in Cambodia, working with the Department of Persons with Disabilities to train staff from provincial rehabilitation centres.

Looking ahead, NOJF plans to extend training to rural India. Beyond fittings, the foundation also offers professional development for therapists, led by experienced paediatric physiotherapists and occupational therapists, all focused on helping children thrive.

Wheelchairs For Kids Australia looks forward to continuing this partnership, bringing independence, mobility and hope to children across Southeast Asia.

A Mother's Courage

Miriam, a devoted mum of three, has faced life's challenges with quiet strength. Raising twins, one with cerebral palsy and the other with autism. Her son Moses spent his first month in the NICU, where meningitis caused the brain damage behind his condition.

As a single parent, Miriam balances irregular work hours while meeting her children's needs, with the help of a nanny and her father. Since Moses' hip surgery, ongoing care and long school absences added extra strain. Mobility was the toughest hurdle until Bethany Kids Kenya fitted him with a WFKA wheelchair, bringing much needed relief.

A Special Visit in Bali

Wheelchairs For Kids Australia volunteers Nigel Bilton and his wife Betty had a memorable experience on their recent trip to Bali. With the help of our partners at the Global Village Foundation, they visited two young wheelchair recipients in their homes south of Ubud.

The first was a bright but softspoken 4 year old boy, born without knee joints and facing spinal challenges. The GVF team carried out maintenance on his wheelchair, fitting new wheels and covers and making adjustments to keep him comfortable and fully supported. Next, they visited a 6 year old girl living with Hydrocephalus. Her wheelchair received careful tweaks, including a new headrest, seat adjustments, fresh wheels and covers, plus a jockey wheel to keep her steady while reclining. Her mum was thrilled with the extra comfort and peace of mind these changes provided.

Nigel described the visits as humbling and a powerful reminder of why he volunteers at WFKA. Huge thanks to Andy and the amazing GVF Bali team for creating these special moments.

News from Tanzania

Comprehensive Community-Based Rehabilitation in Tanzania provides specialised healthcare in Dar-es-Salaam and Moshi. WFKA office assistant Pitu Varsani visited family in Tanzania and met children receiving new wheelchairs.

One of these children is Baraka an 11 year old from Mbande, Dar-es-Salaam. Born healthy, he developed hydrocephalus as an infant, underwent surgery at 12 months and later received therapy to reach milestones such as sitting independently. Today, he can sit and shuffle but has not yet stood, walked or developed speech.

Baraka was thrilled to be fitted for his new wheelchair. His mother learned how to maintain it, giving him greater comfort and mobility.

CCBRT has trained 45 Community Health Workers in Dar-es-Salaam to support children with cerebral palsy and is working to secure more WFKA wheelchairs to reduce waiting times.

We were delighted to welcome Kate Arkwright and Srey Meak from Safe Haven. WFKA partners with Safe Haven to assist children in Cambodia living with disabilities and complex medical needs.

Safe Haven's dedicated team provides therapy, nursing, nutrition and social work support to help each child reach their full potential. They ensure every WFKA wheelchair is safe, comfortable and well maintained, carrying out regular checks and repairs. Through their early intervention training, parents gain the skills and confidence to better care for their children.
